
It's an outrage. And it got us wondering, if GE paid its fair share in taxes like the rest of us, what could our communities do with the \$2.67 billion in lost revenue?

We could pay wages for these public service workers...

Take your pick: an additional \$2.67 billion in revenue could pay the wages of any one of the categories of public service workers listed — or a combination — to help strengthen our communities.

*GE's pretax profits and current taxes paid from 2002 to 2011 are from Citizens for Tax Justice, *GE Tries to Change the Subject,* February 29, 2012. The company's current taxes paid is compared to the statutory rate of 35 percent. Wages for selected occupations are taken from Bureau of Labor Statistics, *May 2010 National Occupational Employment and Wage Estimates,* mean annual wages. The number of Jobs in each occupation whose wages could be funded with the unpaid tax revenue is determined by dividing total unpaid tax by the mean wage for that occupation.
